Guiding Children into the Spiritual Depths with God

THE TIMOTHY PRINCIPLE: Every believing child has value, a calling, and a purpose in the body of Christ today and in the future.

PRIESTHOOD OF THE BELIEVER: Every member of the church is called to minister. (1 Peter 2:9; Matthew 5:16)

THE EZEKIEL PRINCIPLE: Spiritual encounters with God come through taking children into the spiritual depths with Him. They encounter Him as you take them down a path that finds Him.

From Ezekiel 47:1-9, we see five phases of spirituality (referred to as **The Ezekiel Principle**): on the bank, ankle deep, knee deep, waist deep, and swimming. In order to take a person into the spiritual depths with God, we must move them from the bank of the river into the deep end and fully submitting to God.

I Do, (On the Bank)

- 1. You model the Christian faith. "Be imitators of me, just as I also am of Christ." (1 Corinthians 11:1, NASB)
- 2. You are fully submitted to the Lordship of Christ in your life.
- 3. You do daily quiet times.
- 4. You memorize Scripture.
- 5. You faithfully serve in the body.
- 6. You do everything in your group.
- 7. You regularly attend worship.
- 8. You teach, and they observe you.
- 9. You should determine the spiritual condition of your group. Who knows Christ, and who does not?

I Do, _____ (Ankle Deep)

- 1. Administer Spiritual Gift Test and determine the highest scores of those in your group. (only for Christian kids)
- 2. Look for ways to allow them to use their gifts to serve and lead in your group.



The Cross

Prayer and Worship: God Encounters

P.R.A.Y.: The Isaiah Prayer (Isaiah 6:1-8, NIV)

Isaiah had an encounter with God that resulted in God calling him out in obedience to Him. Isaiah saw the worship of the angels, he felt convicted of sin in the presence of God because of God's holiness, and he felt a burden for the people of Israel. Isaiah said, "I live among a people of unclean lips," and then he surrendered to God's will for his life. "Here am I. Send me!" Each day as you approach the Lord, pray in the Spirit as instructed in Ephesians 6:18. Approach Him in worship and thanksgiving, confess any known sin to Him every day, ask the Lord what to pray for according to His will, and then surrender yourself fully to His will for your life every day.

Note: Spiritual warfare is a part of the Christian life, so they must be ready to stand with the armor of God on to defeat the devil's attacks. Putting on the armor is a command, not an option, and it is God's provision for our protection.

Engaging Children in Ministry Using Their Spiritual Gifts

Refer to the Ezekiel Principle on **pages 16-17** for more steps to take to allow children to use their gifts during Disciple Group time.

The **Spiritual Gift Test** (see Appendix A, **page 64**) is an assessment tool. It by no means sets a person's gift for life in the church. As a child grows and matures in their faith, their gifts may manifest themselves later in life. Remember, the Holy Spirit might call a child to do something beyond their gifts and abilities, and we must be there for them and allow them to follow His leadership, even when it does not make sense.

- 1. **Evangelism:** The gift of evangelism is the ability to explain clearly to lost people how to become Christians and to persuade them to desire to be saved.
 - a. All believing children are called to share the Good News of Christ, but some have the specific gift of evangelism.
 - b. Train children in your group how to share their faith.
 - c. Encourage your group to share and have them report back to your group each week.
 - d. Speak with your church leadership about possible opportunities or outreach events your groups can be a part of where they can share.
 - e. Have them pray specifically for God to show them who to share the Gospel with outside your group.
- 2. **Giving:** The gift of giving expresses itself in a desire to give above and beyond our ten percent tithe. The person with this gift finds it easy to give freely and is very cheerful in doing so.
 - a. Talk with your church leadership about specific needs in your church and invite children in your group to give to support the ministry need.
 - b. Have your group sponsor an Operation Christmas Child box.
 - c. Find out if there are families in your church that have special needs and ask children to bring food or clothing to help them.
 - d. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group to help others.
- 3. **Service:** The gift of service expresses itself in a desire to serve others. The person with this gift finds it easy to be a servant in the church and finds great joy and fulfillment in doing so. (Remember, all believers are called to serve, but some have the specific gift.)
 - a. Ask children with the gift of service to arrive early and set up your classroom.
 - b. Ask them to help when a need arises in your group.
 - c. Have them serve snacks or refreshments to your group.
 - d. Think of specific ways they can serve in your group or during other activities.
 - e. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group to help others.



- 4. **Organization/Administration:** Titus was to organize the ministry in Crete. In 1 Corinthians 12:28, there is a list of spiritual gifts that includes administration. The person with this gift helps the church organize itself so it can effectively minister to its own members and to others out in the world.
 - a. Have them take records.
 - b. Have them organize your classroom or your supply tote.
 - c. Allow them to plan an event for your group.
 - d. Allow them to plan out the month, including who will assist with clean up, teaching, memory verse, etc.
 - e. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group to help others.
- 5. **Prophecy:** The gift of prophecy enables a person to speak God's Word boldly so that it brings conviction of sin. Prophets speak to people and confront them concerning sin.
 - a. Children with the gift of prophecy see things in black-and-white; there are no gray areas for them. Help them to show grace while sharing.
 - b. Ask the children with the gift of prophecy to pray and ask the Lord if there is something specific He would like for the child to share with your group.
 - c. Be open to allow this child to share their heart. You may be surprised by what you hear.
 - d. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group to minister to others.
- 6. **Teaching:** The gift of teaching is the ability to teach Bible truths in a way that others might understand and be built up in their faith.
 - a. Invite children with the gift of teaching to assist you as you teach.
 - b. Give them an assigned part in the following week's group Bible study. Have them come up with ways to creatively teach the lesson.
 - c. Encourage them to look for ways they might teach the Word of God to their friends outside the church.
- 7. **Encouragement/Exhortation:** Romans 12:6-8 lists several gifts of the Spirit, including the gift of encouragement, or exhortation. It is given to build up the body of Christ. The person with the gift of encouragement easily edifies other people, helps build confidence, and reminds Christians of the hope they have in Christ.
 - a. Have those in your group with this gift write notes to those who were absent from your group.
 - b. Have them call those who are struggling with their lessons to encourage them and pray for them.
 - c. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group.



- 8. **Shepherd:** The gift of a shepherd is to lead, guide, and feed the flock of God, which is the church. The shepherd, or pastor, is gifted by the Holy Spirit to be a leader. He has the ability and desire to teach, protect, and build up the church.
 - Encourage children with this gift to pray for the needs of individuals in your group.
 - b. Allow them to lead a portion of your time during small group where they take charge and give instructions.
 - c. Ask them to teach the lesson. Encourage them to ask the Holy Spirit to guide them as they prepare and teach.
 - d. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group.
- 9. **Mercy:** Those who have the gift of mercy see the needs of others and find it easy to help them. They are aware of people's needs around them.
 - a. Encourage this child to pray for your group and to show Christ's love to those in your group who have needs.
 - b. Encourage the child's family to volunteer at a homeless shelter to meet the needs of the poor.
 - c. Get with your church leaders and find out ways that the children in your group can minister to individuals in need in your church.
- 10. **Faith:** The gift of faith is an unwavering trust in what God promises. The person with the gift of faith believes that God will be faithful to His Word.
 - a. As they mature, allow the child with the gift of faith to lead your prayer times.
 - b. Write down specific prayer requests in a journal and celebrate with your group when God answers.
 - c. Have this child pray for specific needs in your group.
 - d. Have them pray for the sick and the hurting.
 - e. Have them pray specifically for God to show them how to use their gift outside your group.
- 11. **Helps:** Christians with the gift of helps are those who like to work to assist or help another person's ministry. They usually work behind the scenes.
 - a. Ask children with the gift of helps to arrive early and set up your classroom.
 - b. Find creative ways to give them jobs and responsibilities that allow them to serve behind the scenes.

Preparing Children to Share the Gospel/Counseling

All counseling should be with an open Bible in hand, and those who are counseling should take the time to look up the passages of Scripture and explain them as they go. Having a highlighted Bible makes the process go more smoothly.

Have the children look up the verses of Scripture from the ABC Counseling Card and then highlight the verses in their Bibles. When they look up the first verse, highlight it with a yellow highlighter, then, at the bottom of that page, write the page number where the next verse is found in their Bible. Guide your children through the following steps:

- Have preteens turn to John 3:16 and highlight the verse. Then, have them write the page number for Romans 3:23 at the bottom of this page.
- Highlight Romans 3:23, and then write the page number for Romans 6:23 at the bottom of this page.
- Highlight Romans 6:23, and then write the page number for 1 Corinthians 15:3-4 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight 1 Corinthians 15:3-4, and then write the page number for Romans 10:13 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight Romans 10:13, and then write the page number for 1 John 3:24 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight 1 John 3:24, and then write the page number for John 1:12 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight John 1:12, and then write the page number for 1 John 5:13 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight 1 John 5:13, and then write the page number for Hebrews 13:5 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight Hebrews 13:5, and then write the page number for John 10:28-29 at the bottom of the page.
- Highlight John 10:28-29.

Role Playing/Practicing Before Sending Them Out

Give the children time to practice counseling with each other in your group using their marked Bibles and ABC Counseling Cards.

- Pay close attention to each child as they share and give positive feedback.
- Make suggestions for how to say things better or how to respond to the other person's comments or questions if they need help.
- Remind the L.I.T.s to pray for God's guidance before sharing with a lost person in real life.
- Remind them to listen to the Holy Spirit for discernment.

If at any point you do not feel the child is understanding the Gospel, stop counseling. Explain the Gospel to them and how they can make a choice in the future whenever they are ready because God will listen to them. Lead the child back to the main group.

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

Planning for Success: Year One

THE BOSS PRINCIPLE: Christ is the Head of the church, and it is His vision you are called to fulfill.

THE POWER PRINCIPLE: Prayer is the ultimate source of power, wisdom, and vision for your ministry setting.

THE NEHEMIAH PRINCIPLE: The vision God gives you must lead you to prayer and an effective plan of action for your ministry. A timeline should be laid out in order to develop a strategic plan to engage children in ministry.

NOTE: This vision will not happen overnight. It will span several years.

Phase One: Cast the Vision

- A. Enlist Prayer Team
 - To pray for God's protection and wisdom from above to share your vision for your church.
 - To pray for meetings with pastor, staff, and church leadership.
 - To pray for God to raise up leaders who are called by God to serve in this ministry.
 - To pray for God to give families a desire to become actively involved in the discipleship and spiritual development of their child.
 - To pray for the church family to catch the vision.
- B. Set up meeting to cast the vision with your pastor.
- C. Set up a meeting to cast the vision with your church staff.
- D. Set up a meeting to cast the vision with your elders and deacons.
- E. Set up a meeting with your church leadership.
- F. Share the vision with your church family.
- G. Meet with families to share the vision (before the first Parent Orientation).



Meeting with Your Pastor and Overall Church Leadership

- Open your time with prayer. Ask the Lord to reveal the vision to whomever you will be sharing.
- Show the chart "Four Steps to Disciple and Equip Children & Students" (page 8).
 Explain the steps and principles to embrace children in your church today and to develop them into leaders.
- Share the vision to provide a critical spiritual covering for families in your church.
- Share the steps that it will take for the church staff and church to cooperate across the board.
- Share the story videos from the website.
- Show copies of the resources. Remind them that the student devotionals and leadership materials are all part of the process and not an end in itself. You will accomplish God's vision by take the proper steps of discipleship, equipping, and releasing children for ministry in your church.

NOTE: Not everyone will catch the vision. This is normal.

- A. Leader training
- B. Parent meeting
- C. Parent Orientation
- D. Program start and end dates for the year
- E. Fall retreat (first weekend in October; see Appendix D)
- F. First community ministry opportunity (middle of November; see Appendix E)

- H. Second community ministry opportunity (middle of March)
- I. End of year party
- J. Mission Trip



Phase Three: Determine What Ministry Training You Will Offer

Choose ministry training that is not too complicated at first. This will enable you to train children faster so that they can get involved up front.

- A. Easier training elements: praise team, dowel, etc.
- B. Increased difficulty and mastery levels: puppets, drama, creative arts (These might be added the second year unless the Lord provides the leadership you need up front.)
- C. Look to see what resources are available at your church.
- D. Choosing training that is provided through DVD or Youtube. It does not require a qualified leader to lead a group.
- E. Expect excellence before a group performs. It can be a negative testimony to your ministry if children perform or minister before being properly prepared.

Phase Four: Determine Where Children Will Serve in Your Church and Community

- A. Prayer Team: Prays for wisdom and clear direction on where to place children in ministry
- B. Talk with church staff about opportunities that they might have.
- C. Gain their support to allow children to serve.
- D. Look for places in your areas of responsibility where children can serve (i.e., children's church, greeting, resource room, check in, records, preschool, etc.).
- E. Write up job descriptions and training for children. Do not assume they know what to do.
- F. Educate leadership and show them how to train and release children in ministry.
- G. Look at possible places of service in the community in the fall and spring.



Phase Five: Enlist Leadership

Determine How Many Leaders You Will Need

- Disciple Group Leaders: Should have a 1:3 ratio (two adults in each room)
- Ministry Team Leaders: Need a 1:10 ratio (two adults in each room)

Steps for Enlisting Leaders

- A. Prayer team prays for the following:
 - For God to raise up leaders who are called by God to serve in this ministry
 - For leaders who are sold out for Christ
 - For training sessions, that leaders will grasp the principles of discipleship and empowering children
 - For God to give families a desire to become actively involved in the discipleship and spiritual development of their child

- C. Print applications (downloadable).
- D. Print job descriptions.
- E. Print out copy of "Leadership Handbook."
- F. Set up opportunities to train during your weekly meeting times.

- Ministry Training (30-45 minutes)—Meet & train Disciple Group Leaders
- Worship Time (10-15 minutes)
- Disciple Group (30-45 minutes)—Meet & train Ministry Team

First Training Meeting

- Share testimonial video.
- Review "Developing Servant-Leaders from the Bottom Up" chart.
- Walk through "Becoming an Effective Disciple Group and Ministry Team Leader."
- Give them a copy of the student devotional for their age group.
- Have them do one of the daily devotionals to get an idea of what the children in their group will be learning.



- Walk through the small group leadership materials to become familiar with how it works.
- Discuss phase one of the Ezekiel Principle: "I Do, You Watch." (For the first month or two, spend time here until you know where your group is, and then push away from this point to engage children.)

<u>Note:</u> Train as you go! It is better to share small portions of the philosophy and give leaders opportunities to put them into place. Then, go to the next step, and see them accomplish that task.

First Night

- 1. Distribute devotionals.
- 2. Have children do their first week of devotionals in their group.
- 3. Practice simple ways to memorize Scripture. Have them write their verse on a 3" x 5" card.
- 4. Pump them up with excitement about the year and the journey they are beginning with God.
- 5. Warn them about the spiritual battle.
- 6. Make them aware of the emotional battle to avoid spending time with God. Emphasize the need for making Him priority each day.

- reporting to the N.K./L.I.T. Director



The **Leaders In Training Ministry Team Leaders** are responsible for the following:

- developing lesson plans for training their team in a particular type of ministry (i.e., puppets, praise team, tech, balloon twisting, drama, etc.)

- contacting the N.K.s/L.I.T.s on their team on a regular basis
- reporting to the Director of Ministry Team Leaders

The **Leaders In Training Director of Disciple Group Leaders** will be responsible for the following:

- fully surrendered to the Lordship of Christ in their lives
- striving to fulfill the mission and purpose of L.I.T
- overseeing and training Disciple Group Leaders
- offering encouragement, advice, and direction to Disciple Group Leaders
- holding Disciple Group Leaders accountable to do daily quiet times
- meeting weekly with Disciple Group Leaders for planning and prayer
- dealing with discipline problems, if they arise, with individual N.K.s/L.I.T.s and those who are not doing their daily quiet times
- reporting to the N.K./L.I.T. Director

The Leaders In Training Disciple Group Leaders are responsible for the following:

- Organization/Administration: Titus was to organize the ministry in Crete. In 1 Corinthians 12:28, there is a list of spiritual gifts that includes administration. The person with this gift helps the church organize itself so it can effectively minister to its own members and to others out in the world.
- **Giving:** The gift of giving expresses itself in a desire to give above and beyond our ten percent tithe. The person with this gift finds it easy to give freely and is very cheerful in doing so.
- **Service:** The gift of service expresses itself in a desire to serve others. The person with this gift finds it easy to be a servant in the church and finds great joy and fulfillment in doing so.
- **Evangelism:** The gift of evangelism is the ability to explain clearly to lost people how to become Christians and to persuade them to desire to be saved.
- Prophecy: The gift of prophecy enables a person to speak God's Word boldly so
 that it brings conviction of sin. Prophets speak to people and confront them
 concerning sin.
- **Teaching:** The gift of teaching is the ability to teach Bible truths in a way that others might understand and be built up in their faith.
- Encouragement/Exhortation: Romans 12:6-8 lists several gifts of the Spirit, including the gift of encouragement, or exhortation. It is given to build up the body of Christ. The person with the gift of encouragement easily edifies other people, helps build confidence, and reminds Christians of the hope they have in Christ.
- **Shepherd/Leadership:** The gift of a shepherd is to lead, guide, and feed the flock of God, which is the church. The shepherd, or pastor, is gifted by the Holy Spirit to be a leader. He has the ability and desire to teach, protect, and build up the church.
- **Mercy:** Those who have the gift of mercy see the needs of others and find it easy to help them. They are aware of people's needs around them.
- **Faith:** The gift of faith is an unwavering trust in what God promises. The person with the gift of faith believes that God will be faithful to His Word.
- **Helps:** Christians with the gift of helps are those who like to work to assist or help another person's ministry. They usually work behind the scenes.

A Normal Leaders In Training Evening

Set Up

- Set out laundry baskets labeled for each Disciple Group. Children put their Bibles and notebooks in the appropriate basket as they enter.
- Each notebook is labeled with a colored sticker and number. For example, blue stickers with a "1" on them are first grade boys. On their basket, there is a blue piece of paper with a big "1" on it. For grades that have more than one group per gender, use multiple colors. For example, have a pink "5" group and a yellow "5" group for two different 5th-grade girl groups. The sticker on each child's notebook matches the sign on their basket to help them remember where to put their things.
- Disciple Group Leaders can check the notebooks in their basket while the children are with their ministry teams.
- Set up the 1st-4th grade (N.K.) baskets in a completely different area from the 5th-6th graders (L.I.T.).
- If you take roll, set out the roll sheets and pens on a table near the baskets. Be sure to tell the children to sign in each week. You will likely need someone to be close by and remind them to do that each week.
- Be sure all ministry team supplies are in the appropriate rooms. You do not want leaders wasting ministry team time looking for supplies. At the beginning of the year, let leaders know what your process and time table are for telling you what they need. You could ask them to let you know by noon on Mondays if they need something for Wednesday nights. That gives you time to get everything ready by Wednesday. Set the expectation for them.
- Keep at least one extra notebook for each grade in case you have new children
 or visitors. This will keep you from having to print a new book in the middle of the
 activity of the evening. If possible, keep three notebooks of each age group in a



- certain place and make sure the Disciple Group Leaders know where to find them. That way they can get a notebook when they need it, and they are not looking for you to get it for them.
- Leader notebooks: Put a pencil bag in each leader notebook with a pen, pencil, stickers for incentive pages (if you use them), and bucks (if you use them). You might also put a post-it note pad in each bag in case they need to leave you a note, write a child a reminder note, etc.
- Have a form for parents to complete giving their permission for the Disciple
 Group Leader to contact their child each week. Ask what phone number is best
 for them to call. Compile this information into lists by Disciple Group to give to
 group leaders.

Schedule

- Ministry Teams 30-45 minutes
- Worship Time 15-20 minutes
- Disciple Group Time 30-45 minutes

Helpful Tips

- If possible, try not to use the same people as Ministry Team Leaders and Disciple Group Leaders. Allow adults to focus on one area and do it well.
- Ministry Teams:
 - Some children's ministers like to decide what each Ministry Team will do each semester. Others like to let the Ministry Team Leaders make this decision. You must make this decision based on the confidence you have in your leaders. Let your leaders own their Ministry Team as much as possible. However, give them the training, support, and vision they need to be successful.
 - 2. Think outside the box! Do not just look at what Ministry Teams other churches have done. See what talent you have within your church and how that talent can translate to children.
 - 3. Ministry Teams are FUN! However, that is not their main purpose. They exist to open the eyes of the children to new ways in which they can share the Gospel and/or teach them a way they can serve in the church.
- Worship Time should be an upbeat, energetic time for the children! Remember that the kids have been sitting at school all day. Let them extinguish some energy while praising the Lord!



• Disciple Group Time:

- 1. Be sure the DG Leaders know how important this time is. The teaching is important, but the relationship the leader has with each child is also extremely important.
- 2. Impress upon the leaders the importance of the weekly check-in call with each child. Not only does that give the child a sense of accountability, but it also continues to foster the relationship.
- 3. Let the leaders know that there is more material than they will be able to cover in the allotted time. Prioritize the lesson activities!
- 4. Discussion is a key part of the small group time. Control the talking, but do not hamper good discussion and processing of the lesson.
- 5. Encourage leaders to model what they are teaching. Faith is caught not taught!
- 6. Make it a point to put faith in action during your DG time.



Appendix D:

Ministry Training Handbook

Ministry teams are a vital aspect of the N.K./L.I.T. program. The purpose of ministry teams is to guide kids in the development of their gifts and talents to bring glory to God and to share the Gospel. Through their ministry teams, kids are not only able to see how their gifts can be used to build up the church, but time spent in ministry teams also offers another opportunity for discipleship. Truly effective ministry comes out of our relationship with God. Ministry team leaders have the opportunity to disciple kids in what it means to allow the power of God to inspire teams through their gifts to move the hearts of others. Rather than relying on human power, ministry teams recognize that it is the Holy Spirit who works through us to use our gifts to point others to God. Ministry team leaders also disciple their kids by allowing the kids to do the creating. When they hit a roadblock, leaders are encouraged to guide the kids to seek the Lord for wisdom through prayer. Ministry teams offer a great avenue for discipleship in prayer and listening to God's guidance as we do God's work.

In setting the tone for your specific ministry team, it is important to take the time on the front end to give proper instruction to your team before embarking on the creative process. The first two weeks of ministry team training each semester should focus on the following:

- 1.) Getting to know each of the members of the team
- 2.) Sharing the purpose of the ministry team
- 3.) Praying for God to use the team to glorify Him
- 4.) Instructing members on the "how to" of the ministry team
- 5.) Introducing them to the creative process for the ministry team

Throughout the semester, pray each week with your ministry team for those who will be attending the Night of Worship, the church, the community, and those who are attending mission trip. Also, charge them to pray during the week in their devotion time and ask the Lord for ideas to make His message clear.

Below are some examples of different ministry teams you might consider incorporating based on the gifts and talents of your volunteers:

Puppets

This is a performance group. Using puppets, this team can perform a music routine to a chosen song, or the puppets can be used as props or tools to present the message of the Gospel.



Black Light Dowels

This is a performance group. Using dowel rods that would light up under black light, this group creates a routine according to a chosen song.

Son Beams

This is a performance group that uses dowel rods to create a routine according to a chosen song.

ZAP (Zany Art Projects)

This is a non-performance art group that creates art projects that can be displayed in the church as well as projects the kids can take home or share with others.

Splat

This is a performance-based art group. Together, the group creates one large art piece with an accompanying song.

Percussion

This is a performance group that learns percussion basics to play along with a chosen song or a live worship team. A range of percussion instruments and basics can be learned and utilized in this group.

STOMP

This is a performance group that learns percussion basics to create a "music" routine utilizing everyday items (i.e., buckets, brooms, etc.). This team has the potential to collaborate with other ministry teams for a routine together (for example, drama needing background sound effects).

Lego-mation

This group uses Legos to create stop motion videos to tell Bible stories or stories that teach biblical truths. These videos can be shown during Night of Worship and/or used to benefit the children's ministry during children's worship or Sunday school.

Servant Ninjas

This is a non-performance group that participates in service projects. These projects can be for the benefit of the church or the wider community. Examples of projects this group could take on are the following: stuffing backpacks to donate at the beginning of the school year, making cards for widows in the church, and making packs for the homeless.



Drama

This is a performance group that could use any form of drama to present Scripture, the Gospel message, Bible stories, or Bible truths. Examples include dramatic Scripture reading, skits, tableaus, or dramatic storytelling.

Guitar

This is a performance group that learns guitar basics to play along to a chosen song or with a live worship team.

Shadow Art

This is a performance group that creates a storytelling routine that goes along with a song. The story is told using silhouettes and shadows.

Glow Wall

This is a performance group that creates a routine that goes along with a song. The group uses a "glow wall," which is a glow-in-the-dark version of a regular shadow wall. "How to" instructions and videos are easily available online.

Photography

This is a non-performance group that learns basic photography skills to serve the children's ministry and the broader church community by documenting events through photography. Opportunities for the photography team include taking and editing pictures for baptisms, special events, or during Wednesday night meetings to document other ministry teams' progress.

Ballooning

This is a non-performance group that creatively uses balloons to share the Gospel message. This group learns different balloon-making techniques and learns how to use them as object lessons or visuals in sharing the Gospel with others.

Woodworking/Master's Trade

This is a non-performance group that collaborates to create woodworking projects that could benefit the church or another church/community that the church may be in partnership with.

Cooking

This is a non-performance group that cooks and bakes to service a variety of potential groups in the church. Some ideas include: meals for those in need, baked goods for a group having a retreat, baked goods to thank leaders, etc.



Praise Dance

This is a performance group that creates a dance routine to accompany a praise and worship song.

Gospel in Action

This is a performance group that creatively presents the Gospel using props and other visual aids.

Prayer Warriors

This is a non-performance group that focuses on praying for different people or groups of people. This group may pray through different interactive prayer stations throughout the semester to intercede for their peers, the church, and missions.

Audio Visual

This is a non-performance group that learns how to operate basic audio-visual equipment. Members of this team could use what they learn to serve on Wednesday night, Sunday morning, or at any other special events.

Praise and Worship

This is a performance group that learns how to collaborate as a team to lead praise and worship among their peers by learning how to create actions to songs, to teach new songs, and what it means to lead others into a time of praise and worship. This group may lead worship on Wednesday night or Sunday morning.

Face Painting

This non-performance group learns various techniques for face painting and uses what they have learned during outreach events, such as Fall Festival. This group could also learn how to use face painting or body painting (i.e., Henna) to tell the Gospel story.

Welcome Squad

This is a non-performance group that collaborates to write postcards/letters and visit other children who have visited or have been absent from church on Wednesday or Sunday nights.

Further opportunities for kids to serve in church include the following:

- Setting out devotional book crates
- Handing out stickers
- Setting up for events
- Cleaning up
- Handing out bulletins on Sunday
- Being greeters on Wednesdays and Sundays



- Being part of a welcome team for check in
- Being resource room coordinators
- Being junior helpers in preschool rooms
- Being worship team leaders
- Making phone calls to new kids or kids who have not attended in a while
- Writing postcards to inactive and active members
- Assisting teachers in Sunday school classes
- Being a mission team leader
